It is essential that kids are even more respectful with rescue dogs because of all the recent changes in their lives.

What types of animals do you currently have? Are they dominant or submissive energy levels, personality, good with other dogs & cats.	
Have you ever worked with dogs with behavioral issues?	
Would you be willing to help potty train a dog?	
Are there any things you need your foster dog to be able to do (stay home alone often, be crate trained, walk up and down stairs, sit quietly while you work from home, be potty trained, ride well in the car, sleep in their own bed)?	
<p>NOTE: When a rescue dog/cat finally makes it to their foster home, they have been through a long journey with many changes. Usually, they are rescued from an abusive or neglectful situation, or from the streets. They spend a considerable amount of time with their rescuer or foster parent while getting up to date on vaccines, getting completely healthy, and sometimes getting surgery and healing from it. They form a bond with them and then have to get on a van or plane for a long trip with someone they just met to get to a new rescue organization which sometimes means crossing into the US and going through many hands before reaching you.. You will need to be willing to work with them through a couple of days of odd behavior and then a couple weeks before they have fully decompressed. They sometimes have accidents in the house at first even if that isn't normal behavior for them. They may act scared or want to hide for a couple of days. If you have kids, they are not allowed to get into the dog's face or try playing with them if the dog does not initiate. While they are decompressing, they need space and time to relax.</p>	
After reading the above information about rescue dogs, can you agree to work with them and give them a chance to show their normal self?
